

## CUVÉE BERTRAND

HISTORY & MATURATION: Abbot Father Bertrand Baumann used to be responsible for the winery between 1958 and 1980 and played a major part in the development of the winery. In his days he belonged to the leading winemakers of Austria. The wines from the library are still documenting this period. This blend is dedicated to the memory of his achievements.

CHARACTER: Due to the nature of a blend it is characterized by the varietals chosen as partners, as well as the maturation itself. Pinot Noir, St. Laurent and Zweigelt are matured separately in 600-liter-barrels of austrian oak, before the final cuvée rests another year in large 2500-liter-casks in order to grow together. The final product is a wine that seamlessly partners smooth drinkability with spicy notes and harmoneous tannins in the finish. Great company with an array of foods, from simple to special.

WINELIST-DESCRIPTION: Dedicated to abbot Father BERTRAND this blend of Pinot Noir, St. Laurent & Zweigelt delivers finely structured, but juicy drinkability, minerality, well integrated tannins and berry notes.

The winery is member of the association 'Österreichische Traditionsweingüter', which is working on a vineyard classification project for the Danube area.
